Also, across the concrete drive in front of the bunkhouse you will see a farmhouse. Please don't wonder across there as the farmer and his wife don't care to be disturbed. Renata and I live just two minutes walk from the bunkhouse. If you call us we will be with you to help with your problem quite quickly. But, "please DON'T go over to the farmhouse."

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THE KITCHEN AREA



s you will already have noticed we have a fully functioning kitchen area which includes all the necessary equipment to allow you full self-catering independence. Of course there may be other people staying with you, maybe strangers. Please respect their rights and keep the kitchen area, surfaces and equipment clean and tidy to allow your fellow guests safe and clean use of the area. Every morning after you have left for the day we will come in and clean around for you.

The cleaning schedule can be found in the pamphlet and we always leave a checklist on the table after we finish so you know what has been done for you. Please note that we respect your privacy and security and so won't go into your rooms to clean while you have left personal possessions in your room. However, we will leave you a clean, dry towel every morning folded on your bed. Please also be aware that the water running from the taps is very hot. So please be careful.

THE LIVING AREA



e hope you find the living area and dining area to your satisfaction. We have tried to make it as comfortable as possible. There is Wi-Fi in the bunkhouse and as you may have noticed it is running through an old cellphone perched on the wall above the dining table.

There is also a very efficient electric fire on the wall. Please switch it off before you leave or go to bed as as you know they do use a lot of power. You will find a selection of books and magazines around and you are welcome to read anything you can find.

There is also an ALEXA on the mantle piece above the fire. All you need to do as I'm sure you are well aware is say the word "ALEXA" and she will read you a book, allow you to listen to any music you wish or even play a quiz with you. Just to help you pass the time and have a little fun to boot.

This area, like the others will be cleaned every morning once you have left for the day. You may also charge your electronics from the power points around the bunkhouse.

THE SHOWER ROOM



he shower room and toilet are important areas in any accommodation you may stay at. So again, please respect others and leave it clean and tidy after use. Your fellow stayers" will appreciate this a lot. Of course we will check it and clean it every day for your convenience.

Again, please be aware that the water is very hot. On the wall to your right in the shower room whilst sitting contemplating life, you will find a pen and a large roll of paper. If you feel inclined to write a book, be our guest, but please reference us in your final words when you publish it.

THE BEDROOMS



s you will have noticed by now there are two bedrooms with a set of bunks in each. Please be assured that we change the bedding and sanities after every visitor. So you can be confident that you are sleeping in fresh bedding. I'm sure if you try you will be able to smell my wife's softener. We will change your towel every day for your convenience. It will be left on your bed. If you have left any belongings in you room whilst you are out exploring we won't enter your room, only to drop you a clean towel. It is probably best to take anything valuable with you when you go out.

THE OUTSIDE AREA



he outside area is private and the farmer and his wife would appreciate it if you don't use it as a BBQ area or football pitch. The area to the left of the bunkhouse is for the parking of your cars or motorcycles. Of course please feel free to keep your mountain bikes or bicycles inside the bunkhouse area.

There are two spaces, one running down the side of the inside of the bunkhouse and in front of the bunkhouse doors where you can see them from the sitting area. There are in fact two wall mounted bike racks mounted in the narrow corridor running down the side of the kitchen area. You are welcome to use all.

There is also a shelf to left of the double doors. This is for muddy walking boots and wet and muddy mountain bike shoes. If you need anything drying and it's not sunny outside let us know on the number on page two as we have a spin dryer. We don't mind drying your cycling gear for you if you need it again for tomorrow's ride. Just ask.

CLEANING



e sincerely hope you find our bunkhouse clean and tidy at all times. Renata and I go to great lengths to clean it every day. So together, I'm sure we can do a great job.

MOUNTAIN BIKE HIRE



e have at your disposal a few mountain bikes which you are welcome to hire. There are a number of really great places to ride off-road in the Staffordshire Moorlands. Two of which are Rudyard Lake about a mile from the bunkhouse and The Tissington Trail which is about forty minutes by car from here and runs for miles.

There is also the Manifld Valley. All of which I will list on the "Places to go and things to see" pages in this pamphlet. You can borrow our bikes, helmet and tool packs for £20 for the day. All we ask is that you bring them back. So I will issue you with a good lock. Don't leave them lying around as we all know some people have sticky fingers.

HEALTH & SAFETY



his is probably the most important paragraph of this pamphlet. As you will be aware all health and safety rules must be noted. You will find a health and safety statement on the wall in the living area. A fire extinguisher and a fire blanket close to the cooking area. I also mentioned earlier on a previous page about it being a working farm and the dangers of moving farm machinery and equipment.

The fire and safety equipment including the fire door is there for your protection. We also hold an amount of public liability insurance for your protection. I sincerely hope that this is never used. So please, please adhere to common sense and respect our property and other peoples safety. If you don't know how to use a fire appliance please, do read the label on the device. If you do experience any issues please call me on the number on page two and then of course 999.

Should there be an issue please leave the bunkhouse immediately, call me and stand away from the bunkhouse. SMOKING OF ANY KIND IS NOT ALLOWED ANYWHERE IN THE BUNKHOUSE as it is illegal.






BUXTON




THE ROACHES

The Roaches in Staffordshire is a Peak District gem; located above Leek and Tittesworth Reservoir, it's loved by hikers and climbers alike. The impressively rugged and steep gritstone ridge is home to mythical mermaids and 15 meter natural gritstone clefts, so this is far more than your average countryside walk.

It groups together two main gritstone outcrops, ,Ramshaw Rocks' famous for the ,Winking Man' rock formation and ,Hen Cloud' offering stunning panoramic views.

A pretty village at the northern end of Dovedale, the village is set in some of the very best walking country.


Hartington's past wealth and importance can be seen in the impressive stone cottages and houses around the village square and many ancient routes and trackways
